## Mission of the Month - Waukegan 2 College



Waukegan to College believes there are many hundreds, if not thousands, of Waukegan students not reaching their full potential. For students and families who do not consider college to be an option, Waukegan to College seeks to inform families about the rules of the "college game" through workshops and one-on-one counseling. In addition, support programs like weekly tutoring and coaching, help ensure that students get on and stay on a path to college.

Students in Waukegan to College range from 5th graders to sophomores in college. By starting the program with students just before they enter middle school, W2C establishes high academic expectations and a concrete sense that college, with hard work, is attainable.

Waukegan to College more than doubled from 25 students in its first year to 60 in the 2012-13 school year — this number now includes 3 third-year college, 5 second-year college and 3 first-year college students who would likely not be there without Waukegan To College. Often, W2C works with the oldest child in the family and the younger siblings benefit from the understanding of the college process that parents gain. As the current 1st grader in the family grows up, his parents will be well-attuned to the importance of getting good grades, taking challenging courses, beginning to save for college at an early grade, and the many other critical aspects of pursuing higher education.

A fundamental tenet of W2C is its focus on families. Workshops delivering key information for pursuing college admission are given for students and parents and are presented in English and Spanish.

W2C fosters an environment where families are expected to give back to the program by helping

families new to W2C become oriented to our program and by being W2C ambassadors in their community organizations. We believe that ultimately this family outreach will be instrumental in creating the college-going culture of the long-term vision.

## Mission Interpreter

### A POTTER FIGHTS MALARIA

Not long ago, Juma Sumahil received a small grant from the church in Mozambique, supported by your gifts to the ELCA Malaria Campaign, and used it to start his malaria-fighting pottery business. With his new kickwheel and backyard kiln, he makes beautiful jugs and water filters, all with lids to keep mosquitoes from laying eggs in the water within.

Why is a malaria program helping a small business? Sustainable livelihoods are important to our goal of making malaria history. A family with a steady income can plan and save for durable preventive tools like mosquito nets for everyone in the household. Improved incomes lead to improved nutrition, which leads to improved health and disease resistance for the whole family. Sustainable livelihoods also mean resilience in the face of unexpected expenses, like visits to the clinic if a family member does show signs of malaria.

Juma's jugs and jars contain not only clean water, but a brighter, healthier future for him, his family — and his customers. The comprehensive work supported by the ELCA Malaria Campaign includes programs that equip our companion churches for malaria work, educate communities about malaria prevention and environmental control, provide early diagnosis and effective treatment, and promote sustainable livelihoods. Our Lutheran companion churches in 13 countries in Africa stand together with you in seeking to make malaria history. Your generous giving makes this good work possible.

**Eagle Scouts** On January 18<sup>th</sup> 2014 Ryan and Matthew Hopkins were presented with the rank of Eagle Scout. Eagle Scout is the highest rank in Boy Scouting. It is only presented to 5% of all registered Boy Scouts annually. To achieve the rank of Eagle Scout they had to earn 21 Merit Badges, to develop and execute a service project, show Scout Spirit and hold a Youth Leadership position in their Boy Scout Troop. They also learned how to make ethical choices, preparing them for their future endeavors and how important Duty to God and Country is.

Ryan's Eagle Scout project entailed working with American Legion Post #281 and the Pineview Memorial Cemetery in Beach Park, IL to identify military graves. He captured all the graves in a booklet, so a cadre of volunteers from American Legion Post #281, the Boy Scouts of America and other citizens can place a flag near the graves on every Memorial Day weekend.



Matthew's Eagle Scout project included the scrapping, repairing and painting of the Boy Scout storage garage at the Memorial United Methodist Church in Zion, IL. His team gave over 72 hours to complete the project. His project gave back to the Memorial United Methodist Church who serves as Troop 663's chartered organization.

## Stephen Ministries

**PAYING IT FORWARD:  
CHANGING LIVES ONE AT A TIME**



*"Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.  
Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.  
Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called  
children of God." Matthew 5:2, 7-9*

Shortly after we arrived for a 3-year tour in Roosevelt Roads, Puerto Rico, we found out first-hand what "paying it forward" meant. We were one of 60 families who lost all their household goods in a warehouse bombing and fire in San Juan. One of the nurses from the hospital, whom we hadn't met yet, gave us a monetary gift because she said she had been helped in the past and wanted to pass it on. The great loss we encountered with the fire was over-shadowed by the many, many kindnesses from both new and old friends.

Paying it forward is not a new concept. It was used as the plot in *Dyskolos*, an ancient Greek play written in 317 BC. In 1916 Lily Warner Hammond wrote in her book, *"In the Garden of Delight"*, "You don't pay love back, you pay it forward!" Most of us are familiar with the movie, *Pay It Forward*, about a young boy's class project to make the world a better place by paying a favor *not back*, but *forward*. His idea meant repaying good deeds not with payback, but with new good deeds done to three people. This April 24<sup>th</sup> is Pay It Forward Day. On Pay It Forward Day last year 65 countries participated. Their goal is to make a difference in the world, *one good deed at a time*.

Jesus asks us to "love" one another. Sometimes we may find it difficult to like a particular

person in our life, let alone love them. The love Jesus is referring is not how we *feel* about one another, or a "friendship kind" of love, instead it has to do with how we *act* toward one another, how we *treat* one another. Ask God to help you deal with that difficult person in your life, and remember, too, to pray for that person. You will be amazed how prayer can change one's heart, both yours and his or hers! Opening our hearts and minds can help us better understand others and accept them.

Applications must be returned to St. Mark's by June 1st. Applications for the scholarship may be picked up in the church office.


**Congratulations** to Bridgette Otterbacher.

Update and THANKS from ELCA World Hunger - Sharon Magnuson Associate Director, ELCA World Hunger and Disaster Appeal

As of the close of December, ELCA World Hunger posted \$14,901,577 toward our desired goal of \$19,000,000 by the end of January. November giving results were the largest ever recorded for that month, and December's posting was the second greatest December results. Thank you for all that you do to make this possible. January is a time of significant gift revenue by congregations and synods, and \$4M in income is very possible. We expect to come in between \$18.5- 19M thanks to your work. Thank you!!

In addition, we hit an incredible milestone in December! In the 40-year history of what today is ELCA World Hunger, when we crossed the \$13M total, that moment represented over \$500,000,000 (or half-a-billion dollars) in giving to these ministries since 1974 when hunger ministries started in our predecessor churches. What a heritage! And now the legacy and the next \$500,000,000 is up to us as a ministry of the ELCA as we envision a world where no one is hungry and families' basic needs are met.

The Campaign for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America Approved by the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Pittsburgh, and with an official start date of Feb. 1, 2014, this five-year, \$200 million campaign will:

- Increase this church's capacity to support congregational renewal and the planting of new congregations

- Form new lay, ordained and global leaders for mission
- Encourage and form lay youth and young adult leaders
- Support this church's disability ministry
- Bolster our commitment to walk with global companion churches in shared witness
- Expand our efforts to address poverty and hunger.

While the campaign was approved in the 25th anniversary year of the forming of the ELCA, this also is our moment to look toward the next 25 years and boldly respond to the needs of God's creation with a living, daring confidence in God's grace.

Always Being Made New:

The Campaign for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America – the first of its size and scope in the history of this church – gives each of us the opportunity to make a transformational impact on the ministries of our church. Together, as 4 million members of the ELCA in nearly 10,000 congregations and 65 synods, we are one church with a call to do God's work throughout the world.

Through this campaign, we can expand our mission capacity and achieve things on a scale and scope that we could never do alone. Through this campaign, we can do more. Together, we are called to do more, and in responding to this call, we will continue to live out God's promise of always being made new, and to use our hands – and all that we have – to do God's work.
